

Students Experience Town Government

By all accounts Andover's first **Youth in Town Government Day** was a smashing success! On April 10th, the day was kicked off with a bang thanks to Andover Youth Service staff who engaged students and town employees in a game of Human Bingo. This was a great way for everyone to mingle and talk with each other while finding out fun facts such as who had had a pie thrown in their face and who could do "the worm" or play the piano.

After Bingo everyone settled in for the staff meeting portion of the day. Town Manager, *Buzz Stapczynski* opened the meeting by asking everyone to interview the person to his or her left and then to introduce that person to the group. This was also a nice way for everyone to learn some personal information about other members of the group. The remainder of the meeting included time for each of the department heads to talk a little bit about what was going on in their departments. Some of the projects that the department heads are working on include solar projects, upgrading sidewalks to be ADA compatible, removing a dam, creating an outdoor space at the back of the library, and presenting a warrant article to fund upgrades to the town's technology. *Kathy Urquhart*, Director of Elder Services, also read a beautiful poem written by a member of the writing group called The Write Stuff.

Following the staff meeting the students spent about an hour and a half shadowing the department head they were matched with. The students commented that it was helpful to see how the departments interact with each other. Everyone met back together for lunch which was followed by a lively discussion lead by *Sheila Doherty*, Town Moderator. This discussion included information about Town Meeting, which lead to a discussion about lowering the voting age and the general state of civics education in our schools.

Ultimately, *Youth in Town Government Day* was an excellent opportunity for our students to get a better understanding of what it really takes to run the town

the size of Andover, and it gave the leaders of our town the chance to find out what is important to our youth.

I thoroughly enjoyed my experience participating in the Youth in Town Government Program. I chose to shadow the Director of Elder Services, Katherine Urquhart. From Ms. Urquhart, I learned the basics of how the Senior Center is run and found out about the many and varied resources in place for Andover's senior citizens.

Most of all, I appreciated that fact that my fellow students and I were treated with respect by the members of Town Government, and our opinions were solicited and considered. This made me feel that I truly had a voice.

FACT Hosts Annual Arbor Day Event

The Friends of Andover Community Trees (FACT) hosted its annual Arbor Day event on Saturday, April 21st at Memorial Hall Library. FACT was founded by several League members, along with members of the garden clubs and others who share their interest in trees. Chris Ward, of the Trustees of Reservations, started the event with a discussion of environmentally sensitive land management at the Ward Reservation, including their introduction of bow hunting to reduce deer population. Chris also described how the Trustees have opened up areas of savannah to augment the forested areas of the Ward Reservation. Increasing habitat diversity enables a wider range of insect, plant and animal species to thrive.

Andover Conservation Director Bob Douglas spoke next, explaining Andover has joined the effort to reduce deer population in town, after field reports from botanist Tom Rawinski showed that deer are browsing so heavily that tree regeneration is suffering. This leaves our forests particularly vulnerable to insects and storm damage. Without a healthy vegetative understory, a forest that is damaged cannot regrow. In consideration of tree damage by tornadoes in western MA and Asian Longhorned beetles in the Worcester area, it is important to reduce deer browsing so that the layers of the forest can regenerate. Wildflowers such as Ladyslipper orchids are another indicator of heavy deer browsing. If the wildflowers are missing, it's a clue that deer populations are likely on the rise. Both speakers showed slides of deer "exclosures" in which fencing limits deer browsing and allows plants to regrow.

Andover Health Director Tom Carbone spoke about tick-borne illnesses that are on the rise in Andover, including Lyme disease, Erlichiosis (or anaplasma), and Babesiosis. Deer are an important host of ticks, and are part of the reason ticks are becoming so prolific, although white-footed mice are also hosts. Tom agreed that it's crucial to manage deer populations, but difficult to predict whether this will significantly slow tick-borne illnesses, so he stressed the importance of protective clothing and repellents. Tom also spoke at length about beaver management, showing slides of beaver dams in which "beaver deceivers" have been installed. He shares oversight responsibility with the Conservation Commission, as permits are required for all beaver management activities, and trapping must be done by a licensed professional.
